Adam Shoalts

Spellbinding adventure from Canada's most beloved modern-day explorer.


Traverspine is not a place you will find on most maps. A century ago, it stood near the foothills of the remote Mealy Mountains in central Labrador. Today it is an abandoned ghost town, almost all trace of it swallowed up by dark spruce woods that cloak millions of acres.

In the early 1900s, this isolated little settlement was the scene of an extraordinary haunting by large creatures none could identify. Strange tracks were found in the woods. Unearthly cries were heard in the night. Sled dogs went missing. Children reported being stalked by a terrifying grinning animal. Families slept with cabin doors barred and axes and guns at their bedsides.

Tales of things that "go bump in the night" are part of the folklore of the wilderness, told and retold around countless campfires down through the ages.



Most are easily dismissed by skeptics. But what happened at Traverspine a hundred years ago was different. The eye-witness accounts were detailed, and



those who reported them included no less than three medical doctors and a wildlife biologist.

Something really did emerge from the wilderness to haunt the little settlement of Traverspine. Adam Shoalts, decorated modern-day explorer and an expert on wilderness folklore, picks up the trail from a century ago

and sets off into the Labrador wild to investigate the tale. It is a spine-tingling adventure, straight from a land steeped in legends and lore, where Vikings wandered a thousand years ago and wolves and bears still roam free.

In delving into the dark corners of Canada's wild, The Whisper on the Night Wind combines folklore, history, and adventure into a fascinating saga of exploration.

RECENT GUEST SPEAKER

Hugh Segal

Guaranteed Annual Income September 8, 2021, via Zoom

Hugh Segal, noted political adviser, former Senator, and former head of Massey College, University of Toronto, gave a wide-ranging talk to our Applewood Probus Club September on September 9, 2021. Introduced by Lloyd Posno, and thanked by Tom Axworthy, Segal discussed both the recent Afghanistan calamity and the state of poverty in Canada, making connections between the two topics. Poverty, he stated, is the underlying condition of Afghanistan (which he visited during his Senate years) and it is a condition that the Taliban exploited to return to power.

Canada is not Afghanistan but Segal made the point that according to a Statistics Canada report in 2021, 3.7 million Canadians lived below the poverty line, but unlike many poor societies in the world, Canada has the resources to alleviate this critical problem if we deployed these resources properly. Much of Segal's talk was devoted to the solution he highlights in his recent book" Bootstraps Need Boots", namely a Guaranteed Basic Income. This idea has a long pedigree, starting with the conservative economist Milton

Friedman, running through Richard Nixon who proposed such a plan in 1969, to the Pierre Trudeau government which partnered with Manitoba to create a pilot program in Dauphin Manitoba in the 1970s, to our own time with the Ontario Government of Kathleen Wynne also starting an experimental program in Hamilton and Brantford in 2017(which Segal advised on). These experiments show that basic income support reduces the use of emergency rooms by the poor significantly (among other benefits) . Segal, therefore, argued that the 50 billion cost of a national income program would help the provinces deal with rising health costs as provincial welfare costs would fall with the federal government taking on poverty reduction and health usage by the low income would fall. Thought about broadly enough, Segal maintained, Guaranteed Basic Income support is also a contribution to a better sharing of health costs.

This thesis prompted many questions from Probus members about work incentives and labour shortages, the lessons from the CERB program to respond to the economic impacts of Covid, and the political will to do such a program (not much Segal admitted). Hugh Segal is one of the leading public intellectuals in Canada and his talk to Probus showed why he is regarded so highly,"

Hope this captures it.



The Parade by Dave Eggers



Discussion of the book included the related features of parables, allegories, and fables. All agreed that this novella is very sparse on detail and character development, with an intense concentration on the end of the road to the North. The characters with generic names in a generic country damaged by a generic war are readily imagined anywhere in the world. The characters 4 and 9 resemble the Odd Couple, minus the humor. Nonetheless, 9, with his carefree attitude, eventually forced 4 to take some responsibility for his feckless partner. Some members found it an easy read, while others had to force themselves to finish it. The story does give some detail about life found along

the road, as well as the unintended consequences of a single-minded attention to one goal. The value of providing outside help is shown to be doubtful at best.

Rating for the book: 6.3.
