Kitrina Fex, Executive Director, Heart House Hospice, "Benefits of a Hospice"

Heart House Hospice has been serving the
Mississauga community for over 36 years. We
provide care and support for those that experience a
life-limiting illness as well as support to their
caregivers and loved ones. Our programs include
Hospice Counselling, Bereavement and Spiritual Care,
Help Us Understand Grief (HUUG), Health and
Wellness and Social Connections (Day Program) with
the support of nearly 101 active volunteers that only
enhance and extends our reach. While most
programs support all ages, HUUG directly supports

children and youth for those who have either been living with someone who is dying or has recently passed.

Kitrina Fex is the Executive Director at Heart House Hospice and has been the operational leader since 2021. She brings over 19 years of experience in the healthcare and the legal sectors with a focus on mental health and addictions, homecare and hospice palliative care. Kitrina holds a Master of Social Work from the University of Windsor, a Master of Arts (Social and Developmental Psychology) from McMaster University and is finalizing her Master of Business Administration from the University of Fredericton, specializing in Global Innovative Leadership.

Judy Fountain is the Board Chair of Heart House Hospice. Prior to retirement, Judy was the Chief Financial Officer with the Greater Toronto Airport Authority.

### Future Speakers - May 11 Kevin Donovan, Toronto Star Investigative Reporter, "The Bernard and **Honey Sherman Case**"

Kevin Donovan is the Toronto Star's Chief Investigative Reporter. His focus is on journalism that exposes wrongdoing and effects change. Over more than three decades he has reported on the activities of charities, government, police, business among other institutions. Donovan also reported from the battlefields in the Gulf War and the war in Afghanistan following 9/11. He has won three National Newspaper Awards, two Governor General's Michener Awards, the Canadian Journalism Foundation award and three

Canadian Association of Journalists Awards. As the Star's editor of investigations for many years, Donovan led many award-winning projects for the paper. He is the author of several books, including "Secret Life: The Jian Ghomeshi Investigation" and the "Dead Times" (a fiction novel).

### **Future Speakers - June 8** Tom Herstad, Author, speaker, entrepreneur, "2nd Line West - A True Story"



Born and raised in North End Winnipeg, educated at the University of Winnipeg, Queens University and Oxford, Thomas S. Axworthy has had a distinguished career in government, academia, and philanthropy. He served as the Principal Secretary to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, and he was a key strategist on repatriation of the Constitution and the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

He is the author of numerous books and articles of which the best known is Towards a Just Society, co-authored with Pierre Trudeau. He is a regular contributor to the opinion pages of the Toronto Star, the Globe and Mail, and the National Post. He frequently appears as a commentator on public and national issues.

Ted's writing has regularly appeared in the national press, as well as magazines as diverse as Air Force, esprit de corps and Zoomer. He has also worked as host and contributor for most CBC Radio network programs, PBS in the U.S. and on TV Ontario. After 18 years teaching, he recently retired as a full-time

professor of journalism at Toronto's Centennial College.

In 2011, he was one of 19 civilians presented with the Minister of Veterans' Affairs Commendation. In 2012, the Air Force Association of Canada selected Ted Barris to receive Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee Medal.

Ted's 20th book, Battle of the Atlantic: Gauntlet to Victory was published in the fall of 2022 and immediately landed on the Globe and Mail and Toronto Star bestsellers lists.



The SCR met by Zoom for coffee and discussion.


We discussed the wisdom of the recent indictment of Donald Trump and how to foster public trust in election results and fairness.

The Next Civil War: Dispatches from the American Future by Stephen Marche



There was general agreement that the book is thought-provoking. At the start of the book, the author makes many sweeping, unsubstantiated statements, which gave the appearance of sloppy writing. The blending of fictional dispatches (as by a journalist) and analysis of real situations in the first half of the book was not appreciated by all, although the description of right wing militias was disturbing. The book appeared to be aimed at a New York audience. The discussion on secession was good, particularly regarding the geographic divisions of the US, and constitutional arguments against secession. The political fault lines

in the US were well exposed.
